#### **OUR PROUD IRISH HERITAGE**

The Catholic Order of Foresters What's The Irish Connection?

During the last half of the 19th century, as wave after wave of immigrants came to the United States, the urban areas of the Northeast became home to heavy concentrations of Catholics, especially those from Ireland. The vast majority of these immigrants were poor, having left their homeland due to famine and lack of jobs. These were days of adverse working conditions, miserably low wages, and discriminatory employment practices in the United States—the sign "IRISH NEED NOT APPLY" was frequently seen in store windows.

Living just above subsistence level, these new Americans had little, if any, money to rely on in the event of family catastrophe. Not only was life insurance far beyond their reach financially but also at the time, immigrants were discriminated against by most commercial insurance companies, which refused to insure them. Should death strike the wage earner of the household, there were no resources to help the rest of the family survive. It was common practice for neighbors to go from door to door, in an attempt to collect sufficient money to bury the deceased and raise what little they could for those who remained. As there were no Social Security benefits, Aid to Dependent Children, or other governmental welfare assistance at that time, the death of a breadwinner often meant financial ruin and resulted in the dissolution of the family.

To combat this, a small group of Irish Catholic Bostonians began looking for ways to band together to protect their families on their own. On March 12, 1879, they inaugurated a fraternal benefit society composed exclusively of Roman Catholic men, which they called the Massachusetts Catholic Order of Foresters. This society, the first Catholic fraternal insurance organization in Massachusetts, was officially chartered on July 31, 1879, and was the first to provide much needed life insurance protection to struggling Catholic families.

Of course, many of these Catholic immigrants were also finding it difficult to assimilate into a primarily Anglo-Saxon Protestant industrial society, especially those from agricultural -based economies. So in addition to insurance benefits, the Catholic Order of Foresters also established regional lodges, called Courts.

These fostered a friendly and supportive social environment where Catholics could congregate. By the turn of the century, the Society's membership was growing rapidly. Subordinate courts were springing up throughout the state. In 1894, women were permitted to become Foresters and in later years, the Foresters admitted children as junior members, resulting in a larger and more enthusiastic, family-oriented organization.

Being legally permitted to insure anyone who qualified, in 1961, the Society expanded its membership to include the other New England states and Florida. At that time, the name was changed to the Catholic Association of Foresters. Soon the ideals and purposes of the Catholic Foresters were copied by other newly established fraternal groups.

Today, the Catholic Association of Foresters is a benevolent society of members who are insurance policy holders as well as benefactors in their communities. The monies that are raised through dues and policy sales enable the Society to annually award scholastic grants for college education.

Members also support charity fundraisers in addition to the countless charitable deeds performed by individuals. The permanent charity fund provides for donations to the Bishop, for religious educational programs, as well as other charitable needs.

**Did You Know?** It takes three years and a day to make Irish whiskey. For example, Scotch is distilled twice while Irish is distilled three times, giving it a lighter and mellower flavor. The spelling of the word Whiskey (as opposed to Whisky) originated in the 19th century when Scotch whisky was of very low quality. When exporting to America, the Irish distillers wanted to differentiate their product from the poorer Scotch whisky, and added the 'e' to mark the crucial distinction.

Do you know what is the Greatest Irish invention ever? Every literate person in the western world and beyond uses it every day! In fact you are using this invention to read this piece now?


What is it? It is the space between words! That's right, ancient texts were written without spaces.

However, Ireland was never part of the Roman Empire and the Latin language was foreign to the Irish. Accordingly when Latin texts arrived with Christianity, words needed to be separated to allow for their translation into Irish and empower the native speakers to learn the Latin language. Scriptio continua (continuous text) as it is known was written as an aidememoire therefore the writers did not need word separators as these writings contained information that was already known to them.

The earliest Greek inscriptions used interpuncts (dots between words), which was common in the writing systems that preceded it. The practice waned however and scriptio continua became commonplace.

#### **IRISH CITIZENSHIP**

Are you **Entitled to claim Irish Citizenship?** 

#### **Citizenship by Descent**:

A person whose father or mother was born on the island of Ireland is automatically an Irish citizen.

A child whose non-Irish-born father or mother was an Irish citizen at the time of the child's birth may become an Irish citizen by registering in the Foreign Births Register at the nearest Irish Consulate.

A person who has at least one grandparent who was born in Ireland may become an Irish citizen by registering in the Foreign Births Register at the nearest Irish Consulate.

A person whose **great-grandfather or great-grandmother was** born in Ireland may claim Irish citizenship **provided** that the person's parents had registered in the Foreign Births Register (i.e., received their Irish citizenship) **before the person's birth.** 

NOTE: The process of applying for Irish Citizenship by Descent is also called Foreign Births Registration or FBR.

How about <u>Claiming Irish Citizenship through</u> <u>Marriage</u>? (\*\*Click on link for more Information.) Since 2005, residence in Ireland is required in order for spouses of Irish citizens to apply for Irish citizenship.

Order state-certified Irish BMD (Birth/Marriage/Death) Certificates at www.Certificates.ie. (\*\*Click on link for more Information.) The cost is about \$30 each including postage, and assuming you have all the necessary ordering details, takes about 2 weeks. If the BMD happened in Northern Ireland after 1921, order those certificates at nidirect.gov.uk (\*\*Click on link for more Information.)

## The Subject of the Brown's Island Memorial

The first blast lifted Mary Ryan off the floor. The second blew her to the ceiling.

The Confederate munitions factory on Brown's Island exploded with a fury that killed more than 40 of its female workers, an event that shocked the city on March 13, 1863, and inspired an outpouring of sympathy. The home front disaster was Richmond's worst during the Civil War.

Ryan, an Irish teenager like many of the other workers at the Confederate States Laboratory, accepted blame for the explosion during the several days she lingered in pain.

She confessed to Col. Josiah Gorgas, chief of ordinance, that she had banged a perforated wooden board containing friction primers against a table to knock them loose. The jostling was strong enough to ignite at least one of the primers, which set off an explosion that demolished most of the 70-foot building. Between 80 and 100 workers, mostly women, were in the room either at their jobs or warming themselves at a coal stove. An official report counted 69 casualties, of whom at least 44 died.

Only a few of the victims died instantly. Others suffered "the most horrible agonies, blind from burns, with the hair burned from their heads, and the clothing hanging in burning shreds," the Examiner wrote. A few jumped in the river to extinguish the flames.

For the rest of the month, deaths from the accident mounted. Mary Ryan, age 18, died March 16 at the home of her father, Michael Ryan, who also worked at the arsenal.

Later investigation showed that even though Mary Ryan got the blame for the spark, the severity of the accident was not her fault. Because black powder dust was in the air from some of the other activities, she said, "When you have a spark, it's going to ignite. It's airborne. It makes it understandable how there was such an explosion and immediate fire."

By the end of March, the Daily Dispatch reported that work had resumed at Brown's Island. There was no shortage of new workers, Barber said.

"There were women waiting outside to apply for the vacancies. They were paid so well for working-class women." It was a horrible event, one of the worst explosions, certainly was the worst one in Richmond."

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Many IAS "Thank You's" to Karon Bell, Ann McGehee and Kathryn O'Meara for their efforts in bringing this monument dedication and placement to fruition. Their efforts have brought to the forefront – a very sad story about the Irish in Richmond, their hardships and sacrifice. For myself, it was a total eye-opener.

# <u>Another Notable Richmond Irish –</u> <u>Buried in Hollywood</u>

WILLIAM BURKE, and his wife CHRISTIANA, were both Richmond schoolteachers. Edgar Allen Poe entered Burke's "Seminary" for boys on 1 April 1823, during the session that had begun on 2 January. In June 1824 (or 1825) Burke was one of the bystanders who witnessed Poe's feat of swimming 6 miles – against the current - in the James River. It was an event that Poe often referred to. Along with John Hartwell Cocke, at whose Bremo Academy he had formerly taught, Burke may have persuaded John Allan to send Poe to the University of Virginia. Burke wrote two books, The Rudiments of Latin Grammar (1832) and The Mineral Springs of Western Virginia (1842); he translated parts of Virgil's Aeneid for the Southern Literary Messenger.
