I HAD NO IDEA!

You know how you just love the scenery in some old movies... don't be too quick to judge – some might have their landscapes firmly rooted in Ireland!



Braveheart: Following this blockbuster the tourism industry of Scotland recorded a boost of over 100 percent. Little did those tourists know - that most of the battle scenes were filmed in Ireland. All scenes depicting London were shot at Bective Abbey, County Meath. The Battle of Stirling Bridge was filmed on the Curragh Plains, County Kildare and the scenes set in York were actually filmed at Trim Castle, County Meath, the wedding in the hills of Glendalough (above).

Saving Private Ryan: The famous opening twenty minutes of "Saving Private Ryan", which is set on D-Day on Omaha beach, were actually filmed in County Wexford. Filming lasted for two months and took place on Ballinesker Beach, Curracloe Strand. The Irish Defense Forces supplied 2,500 men to act as extras.

Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince: - There's a dramatic scene when Harry Potter and Professor Dumbeldore are battling with evil. The camera swoops in towards some cliffs (the Cliffs of Moher, County Clare) and then we spot our two heroes standing on a rock (Lemon Rock, County Kerry).

<u>The Princess Bride</u>: This 1987 fairy tale tells the story of heroes whose goal is to rescue a beautiful princess, Buttercup. A masked man in black follows them across the sea and up the Cliffs of Insanity (again the Cliffs of Moher, County Clare).

<u>The Italian Job</u>: In this 1969 classic, staring a very young Michael Caine, all of the jail scenes were actually filmed in Kilmainham Jail, in Dublin.

<u>The Tudors</u> - Though it might not count as a movie it might surprise you to know that every little scrap of TV series, "The Tudors" was shot in Ireland. Locations included Powerscourt Estate, County Wicklow and Dublin Castle, Kilmainham Jail and the People's Gardens in Dublin.

Baileys Black & White Cake



Preheat oven to 350°F

Cake Ingredients:

1 (18.25 oz) package devil's food cake mix

1 (3.9 oz) pkg. instant chocolate pudding mix

4 eggs

One Moment in Time:
The Solstice Seen from Newgrange




Deep inside the world's oldest known building, every year, <u>for only as much as 17 minutes</u>, the sun -- at the exact moment of the winter solstice -- shines directly down a long corridor of stone and illuminates the inner chamber at Newgrange.

Newgrange was built 1,000 years before Stonehenge and also predates the pyramids by more than 500 years.

Lost and forgotten along with the civilization that built it, the site was been <u>rediscovered in 1699</u>. Excavation began in the late 1800s and continued in fits and starts, until it was undertaken in earnest in 1962. It

was completed in 1975.



Michael O'Kelly drove from his home in Cork to Newgrange. Before the sun came up he was at

the tomb, ready to test his theory.

I was there entirely alone. Not a soul stood even on the road below. When I came into the tomb I knew there was a possibility of seeing the sunrise because the sky had been clear during the morning.'

He was, however, quite unprepared for what followed. As the first rays of the sun appeared above the ridge on the far bank of the River Boyne, a bright shaft of orange light struck directly through the roof box into the heart of the tomb. I was literally astounded. The light began as a thin pencil and widened to a band of about 6 in. There was so much light reflected from the floor that I could walk around inside without a lamp and avoid

bumping off the stones. It was so bright I could see the roof 20ft above me.

I expected to hear a voice, or perhaps feel a cold hand resting on my shoulder, but there was silence. And then, after a few minutes, the shaft of light narrowed as the sun appeared to pass westward across the slit, and total darkness came once more.'

Since that time, people from all over the world have made the pilgrimage to Newgrange to bear witness to this ancient ritual begun over 5,000 years ago and only brought back into the light for the last 40.

The unknown makers built well.

And they built for a very long time:

Five thousand years ago, the people who farmed in the lush pastures of the Boyne Valley hauled 200,000 tons of stone from the riverbank a mile away and began to build Newgrange. At the foot of the mound, they set ninety-seven massive kerbstones and carved many of them with intricate patterns. Inside, with 450 slabs, they built a passage leading to a vaulted tomb, and placed a shallow basin of golden stone in each of its three side chambers.

Like so much else from the Age of Myth the "why" of it all at Newgrange will never be known. The people who took 20 years to move 200,000 tons of rock left us no clues beyond the spiraling runes cut into the rock. Like all the mysteries that emerge from time with no footnotes, it is left to us to make what meaning we can from them. But perhaps this one monument from the Age of Myth gives us, every year, one small hint.

No matter what time and the universe can throw at us, we still go on. To remind ourselves that we have and shall endure and prevail, we still mark our small planet's turn around our home star. We mark it with ceremonies every year when, at this moment in time, the sun begins to rise higher to warm us again in our small patch of heaven. And we are still here to bear witness, no matter how shrill the Acolytes of Zero, to the mystery and the gift. We're a tough race and a rough species. It will take more than a few degrees centigrade, one way or another, to finish us.

The light of the solstice pierces to the heart of the tomb at Newgrange, and then, soon after, the Light of World arrives. Two moments that remind us of the many manifest miracles of God. Reminders that no winter is without end and that The Gift is given to us again, if we can but receive it. More than 31,000 people applied for the 100 tickets available to visit Newgrange during the winter solstice on December 21.

From Regency Square area & West End-

- Take Parham Rd to Chippenham Pkwy, (VA 150 via Wiley Bridge) about 4 miles Merge onto VA 76 S Powhite Pkwy (toll) Continue 2.4 miles to Midlothian Turnpike (US 60 WEST) exit to 60 W.
- Maneuver to left lane go to 2nd stoplight turn left onto Arch Road. On Arch there is a "Little Caesars" on the left and 7-11 on the right.
- Take the 2nd right onto Redbridge Road. (There is a large Church on the right as you turn) The Community Center
 is the first left hand turn.

From Amelia - Brandermill - etc,

- From 360 merge onto VA 288N
- Take Exit VA76 Powhite Parkway/Lucks Lane exit toward old Hundred Road
- Merge onto US60 WEST Midlothian Turnpike toward Midlothian (Get off at the Midlothian exit be sure to take the 2nd Midlo ramp – not the first.)
- Maneuver to left lane go to 2nd stoplight turn left onto Arch Road. On Arch there is a Little Caesars on the left and 7-11 on the right.
- Take the 2nd right onto Redbridge Road. (There is a large Church on the right as you turn) The Community Center is the first left hand turn.)

From VA Commons and North -

Merge onto I-95 S via the ramp to Richmond

Take exit 79 for I-195 S/I-64 W toward Powhite Pkwy

Keep left at the fork, follow signs for Interstate 195 S/Powhite Parkway/U.S. 60/U.S. 360 W and merge onto I-195 S

Continue onto VA-76 S - Partial toll road


Take the US-60W/Midlothian Turnpike exit

Move to the left Lane – take the 2nd left turn – N. Arch Road On Arch – there is a "Little Caesars" on the left and 7-11 on the right.

Take the 2nd right onto Redbridge Road. (There is a large Church on the right as you turn) The Community Center is the first left hand turn.)
