I got this <u>Ultra Tempting Invitation</u> for IAS members from our favorite Legal Eagle and IAS member – Carol Daugherty Rasnic – author of the book, *"<u>Can Sean And John Live In Peace? An American Legal Perspective</u> (book review below)

Dear Nancy. - In case anyone in the IAS is interested in attending the Northern Ireland Conflict sessions of my course, Seminar in International Legal Issues at VCU this fall – the Irish sessions are on Tuesday, November 10th, 17th, & 24th from 4-6:40 pm in the Trani Life Sciences Building - Room 0255 - Second Floor. These last three sessions on Northern Ireland will reference my book and I will have several handouts. We'll also have one more class on the first Tuesday in December, during which I'll show selections from a PBS documentary on The Troubles. Closer to those dates, I can be more specific about what I'll be covering each night (i.e., Irish history including religious discrimination and British statutory law that compounded that discrimination; laws addressing the "Troubles" and past efforts at selfgovernment for Northern Ireland - including what happened after Bloody Sunday, the Good Friday Agreement and its aftermath, and more.

Also, I just contracted to write a second edition of my book on this issue, and I'll be incorporating those additional events/changes into these sessions at VCU.

"Can John & Sean Live in Peace" - A review

A Southern Belle Looks at Northern Ireland -

This book allows the American reader to gain insight into the true nature of what the Irish call "The Troubles".

The conflict between Catholic and Protestant factions is viewed from the perspective of an American woman. Her experience with segregation in the American South enabled her to understand the cultural and economic factors that divide these groups.

Her insight clarifies the fact that this is not simply a religious issue. It is one of long standing cultural and economic differences between all factions.

I found this book to be an invaluable aid in understanding the complex and difficult social hostilities that afflict these people of a common background.

Professor Rasnic has spent a great deal of time in Northern Ireland and the Irish Republic. Her contacts with officials, politicians, clerics, and most of all, Irish citizens gives her a special perspective. This was an enjoyable and educational read.

THE HAUNTED CASTLES OF IRELAND -

- Ardgillan Castle is twenty miles north of Dublin, on the coast between Balbriggan and Skerries. The ghost of a woman is said to haunt the "Lady's Stairs" railway bridge on the estate.
- Charleville Castle is in Tullamore, County Offaly, in the East Coast and Midlands Region. It is said to qualify as one of Ireland's real haunted castles. It is haunted not only by the ghost of its former owner, but also by druids buried on the grounds and by a little girl who fell to her death from a high staircase.
- <u>Ballygally Castle</u> is 20 miles from Belfast on the Antrim coast in County Antrim, Northern Ireland. A beautiful castle hotel with the ghost of Lady Shaw.
- Gormanston Castle in Gormanston, County Meath, in the East Coast and Midlands Region, was owned by a family for seven centuries. Legend has it that foxes surrounded the castle whenever a family member was dying. The castle is now used as a boys' secondary school.
- <u>Killua Castle</u> in County Westmeath is said to have a ghostly figure of a former employee of the family wandering about at night.
- Kinnitty Castle, near Kinnitty, County Offaly, in the East Coast and Midlands Region, is a beautifully restored castle hotel situated on land once inhabited by Druids. This castle has the resident "Phantom Monk of Kinnitty"
- Leap Castle near Roscrea, County Offaly, in the East Coast and Midlands Region, is considered by many to be the most haunted castle in Ireland. The bloody past of massacre and murder led to the presence of unhappy ghosts and unexplained noises, place it at the top of the list of real haunted castles. Ghost hunters and researchers have studied its history and some say they experienced the presence of spirits as they filmed at the castle for television shows and videos. (From My Guide Ireland)

GOODWIFE "GOODY" ANN GLOVER

On November 16, 1688 the last woman to be hanged in Boston as a witch was Goodwife "Goody" Ann Glover, an Irish laundress and Irish-Catholic woman, who could not recite "The Lord's Prayer" in English - only in Latin. Glover was an Irish slave, sold to the Barbados by Englishman Oliver Cromwell, during the occupation of Ireland in the 1650s. Her husband died there persecuted for his own religious beliefs.

By 1680 she and her daughter were settled in Boston employed as housekeepers by John Goodwin. When she scolded a 13-year-old child who had accused Glover's daughter of stealing, the girl and her brother went into fits, claiming sharp pains and being struck deaf and dumb. Eventually, four of the five Goodwin children fell ill. Their doctor concluded "nothing but a hellish Witchcraft could be the origin of these maladies." Martha, the 13-year-old daughter, confirmed the doctor's diagnosis by claiming she became ill right after the argument with Glover.


Glover was arrested and tried as a witch. In the courtroom there was confusion over Glover's testimony, since she refused to speak English, even though she knew the language. According to Cotton Mather, "the court could have no answers from her, but in the Irish, which was her native language." The court convicted Glover of witchcraft and sentenced her to be hanged."

Robert Calef, a Boston merchant who knew her, said, "Goody Glover was a despised, crazy, poor old woman, an Irish Catholick who was tried for afflicting the Goodwin children. Her behavior at her trial was like that of one distracted. They did her cruel. The proof against her was wholly deficient. The jury brought her guilty. She was hung. She died a Catholick." Her last words were reportedly, "I die a Catholic" and that may have been a more treacherous statement to the crowd

During the trial the infamous Reverend Cotton Mather, pastor of the Old North Church, called Glover "a scandalous old Irishwoman, very poor, a Roman Catholick and obstinate in idolatry." A decade after Glover was hanged Mather was still preaching against "idolatrous Roman Catholicks," trying to preserve a parochial society in a world that was quickly changing.

On November 16th 1988 the Boston City Council recognized the injustice done to Ann Glover 300 years earlier, and proclaimed that day "Goody Glover Day", condemning her execution because she would not renounce her Faith. (Irish Echo – November 2000)

And On a Much Lighter Note – A Little Irish Halloween Treat for the Kids



Halloween, the fastest-growing holiday in the United States, has its origins in the Celtic world. In Ireland, it has long been known as Snap Apple Night, and many of its traditions, like bobbing for apples, have been brought to America over time. Thankfully, the goblins did not come over, too!

And as the story in this Irish Children's book goes - One year on the Emerald Isle, as eleven *t'ank Gods* (children) get ready for the fun, their mother Maise Magee sets out to fetch water for the apple barrel. Three goblins spy Wise Woman Magee along the way and know that she could use her magic to help their sick friend Rua. Now, as everyone knows, goblins do not ask for what they want-they just take it. And once they have something (or someone), they hold on for as long as they can. What becomes of Maise Magee, her eleven *t'ank Gods*, and Rua and the other goblins is anybody's guess. Anything can happen on *An Irish Hallowe'en*.

Guinness and Onion Soup

Prep:20 min -Cook:40 min (Easy) Serves: 6

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 5 cloves minced garlic
- 8 cups thinly sliced onions

Gray salt

- 1 tablespoon fresh thyme leaves, chopped
- ½ cup sherry vinegar
- 1& ½ cups dark beer (<u>recommended</u>: Guinness)©
- 6 cups beef stock
- 6 slices country bread cut 1/2-inch thick, toasted 1/2 pound Irish Cheddar, sliced thin

Directions

Heat the olive oil in a large skillet over high heat. Add garlic and cook briefly to release aroma. Add onions, season with salt and cook for about 5 minutes stirring often. Reduce heat to low and cook for about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally until the onions are golden brown.

Add the thyme, vinegar, and beer. Reduce beer by half and add the beef stock. Bring to a simmer and cook for 10 more minutes.

Preheat the broiler. Transfer soup to an ovenproof serving dish or individual ovenproof soup bowls. Top with toasted bread slices and sliced Irish Cheddar. Broil until cheese melts and starts to brown slightly. Serve piping hot.

Banshee Breath (or Hot Whiskey)

- 1 1/2 ounces of Irish whiskey (Jameson, Bushmills)
- 2 teaspoons brown sugar
- 2 slices of freshly cut lemon
- 6 cloves
- 1/2 cup boiling water

Pour whiskey and sugar into a strong heatproof glass. Embed 3 cloves into each lemon slice and place in glass. Add the boiling water and stir until the sugar has dissolved. Bottoms up! © (For Medicinal Purposes only of course)



THE IRISH HERITAGE LICENSE PLATES - I

haven't heard from any of our Richmond IAS members to let me know if you're interested in the project suggested by IAS member Ryan Rourke to get Irish Heritage license plates approved by the DMV in Virginia. I got several calls from folks in the Tidewater area that are very excited about the project and expressed their intention to purchase the Irish Heritage plate. If any of you are interested in the project, or would commit to ordering the Special Plates for your car - please email me - bearfan46@verizon.net or call me at 804-323-6415- otherwise – I would suggest that we abandon the project and perhaps another Irish group would be interested in pursuing the possibility. All information on cost and requirements is at the DMV site DMV Special <u>Plates Information</u>. The plates can be set up as Revenue Sharing or Non Revenue - meaning that the group suggesting the plates could earn revenue on plates sold. The non revenue sharing extra cost for special plates is \$10 annually and The revenue sharing plate costs \$15 annually. 350 orders have to be placed before the State will begin to process the request. I think it's a great idea - but I wonder if we can get 350 interested Irish to sign up so that the project can get going. What do you think???

ATTENTION ALL GENEALOGY HUNTERS!

An important new tool in tracing your Irish family history has been released in Ireland. The National Library has released a searchable online database for the April 1911 family census for the entire 32 counties. Genealogists can search by name, surname, age, sex and place. Even better, the entire database is free. This is the first time such information - which includes the images of the original census forms - has been put online. The forms offer a view into an Ireland from long ago. A world divided into type of resident (boarder, visitor or family) religion, literacy, profession, marital status, Irish language ability and children.

The project has so far taken three years to get online and the results are astonishing. The census search is markedly different from the Central Statistics Office tables that cover 1926 to 1991 and were released earlier this year. They show the data tables from the Central Statistics Office rather than the actual forms or identifying information. The head of the 1911 census search project said the CSO census forms are still considered too modern for public release and the records themselves remain confidential for 100 years.

The 1911 census - which is available two years short of the 100 yr limit - was the last census completed until 1926. Crowe said they hope to get the 1901 census online by spring 2010; they released the 1911 census first because it as better quality than the 1901. Crowe said she also hoped to include Google maps to compare street maps between 1911 and now. (Kelly Fincham)
